Alfred Riley Centenarian 1866-1966

Born in a log cabin in Warren County, Ohio, Alfred Riley lived to be 100 years old. He came to Dayton when he was 18, finding work as an iron molder. According to Mr. Riley, he never spent more than \$50 on medical expenses in 85 years; though he did sign up for Medicare in 1965.

He explained his reasoning to the Journal Herald in 1966; "It's just that when a man is 99 and soon to be 100, it's best that he have some health insurance to fall back on."



CLAYTON COUPLE WED 50 YEARS
CELEBRATING their golden wedding anniversary, Mr. and
Mrs. Alfred Riley of R. R. 1, Clayton, will be at home to their
friends and relatives this afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock. Mrs.
Riley is the former Alice Nicholas of Darke county. Mr. Riley
was born in Warren county. The couple resided in Dayton after
their marriage until 17 years ago when they moved to their
present address.

`Alfred Riley married his wife, Alice, in 1892—celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary in 1942. Together, they had three daughters and one son. Alice died in 1952 at the age of 82. Mr. Riley moved in to an apartment in his daughter's house when he was 91. He "doesn't need much care at all," his daughter told the Journal Herald in 1966. "He's as alert as ever."

Even at the age of 94, Alfred kept up with his own cooking,

baking, and grocery shopping. No fan of boxed mixes, he kept a large apothecary cookie jar full of homemade treats. "I never let that get empty," Mr. Riley told a Dayton Daily News reporter in 1960, offering him a mincemeat cookie*.

Mr. Riley's specialty, however, was turtle soup; "Had an unbeatable recipe," he told a Journal Herald reporter in 1966. As a young man, he was known as a champion turtle-catcher in the area, but by the time Dayton reporters spoke with him in the 1960's, Alfred had stopped catching turtles and was more interested in carving them.

"My stuff isn't fine art," he insisted, "but I've always been handy about such things."

'Such things' included the pipes Mr. Riley liked to smoke;

"Been smokin' a pipe for 82 years," he told the Journal Herald, pointing out his large collection of hand-carved pipes.

Many of Alfred Riley's creations were given to friends as gifts, though Mr. Riley's home was well decorated with the rest. At the Woodland Minute, we'd love to see his carving of a pair of kangaroos (and their joeys) mid-boxing match; not to mention the cement turtle "so real you'd shoot him if you saw him by the river bank."

Alfred's talents weren't just on the artsy side—he even made himself a set of dentures: "I made these myself out of aluminum. I have some in the drawer the dentist made for me but they just weren't comfortable, so I made my own. Most comfortable things I've ever worn."

In 1966, at the age of 100, Alfred Riley died. Surviving him were three daughters, one son, eleven grandchildren, ten great-grandchildren,

one great-great-grandchild, countless works of art, innumerable whittled pipes, and one set of hand-made aluminum dentures.

Alfred and Alice Riley are buried in section 14, lot 2356 at Woodland Cemetery.


Founded in 1841, Woodland is one of the oldest rural cemeteries in the United States.




Women of Woodland Tour:




