

Science




William Werthner

A biology teacher, William Werthner brought his students (including Orville & Katharine Wright!) to Huffman prairie and asked them to collect, identify, and diagram leaves and seed pods they found.

As an arboretum, Woodland is delighted to share our love for and wide variety of trees! Students of all ages collect leaves and seed pods while learning about the irreplaceable role of trees in our ecosystem.



William Werthner died in 1929. He is buried in section 109, lot 2332 at Woodland.



Dr. August F. Foerste

Dr. August Foerste was an internationally respected geologist and paleontologist who published over 5,500 pages on geology and produced over 650 photographic plates of fossil material.

Just like teachers today, he taught his students about how different types of rock are formed. Woodland is a great place to illustrate this lesson—with the hundreds of markers, monuments, buildings and boulders, students see geology close up. Dr. Foerste died in 1936. He is buried in section 126, lot 55 at Woodland.



History



Margaret Peters

Margaret Peters was a noted historian, author, community activist and volunteer. Beginning her teaching career in the Dayton Public Schools, Margaret was a staunch advocate for opening opportunities to all children. She was instrumental in implementing Black history in the middle school curriculum, ensuring that chapters of Dayton's history are not forgotten.

Woodland is a treasure trove of local history—within 200 acres, students can discover heroes and villains, famous faces and ordinary folks who made Dayton what it is today.

Art



Martha K. Schauer

Martha taught at Stivers High School for 45 years. She also founded and directed the Saturday school at the Dayton Art Institute. A renowned water colorist in her own right, Martha emphasized good design, drawing



Robert H. Whitmore

A graduate of Steele High School, Robert Whitmore studied art in Chicago and graduated from the Chicago Academy of Art. He held a studio at the U. B. Building in downtown Dayton until he was drafted into skills, and good color.

Two of Martha's students became famous and successful artists: Milton Caniff- '25, cartoonist of the nationally syndicated "Terry and the Pirates" and "Steve Canyon" comic strips; and Lloyd Ostendorf '39, an Abraham Lincoln scholar and artist. WWI. Robert was assigned to Company F, 25th Engineers at American University camp in Washington, D. C; using his artistic talents to benefit the camouflage division. After the war, Whitmore became an associate professor of painting at Antioch College.


Woodland Historic Tour:

Not into public speaking? Consider getting involved with our horticulture team, or assisting with special events & research projects.






