

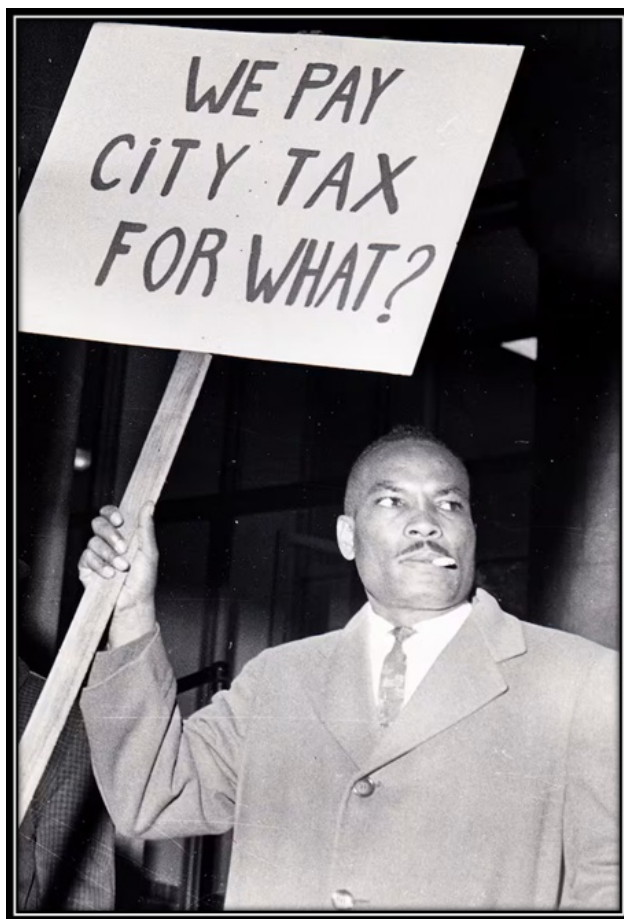

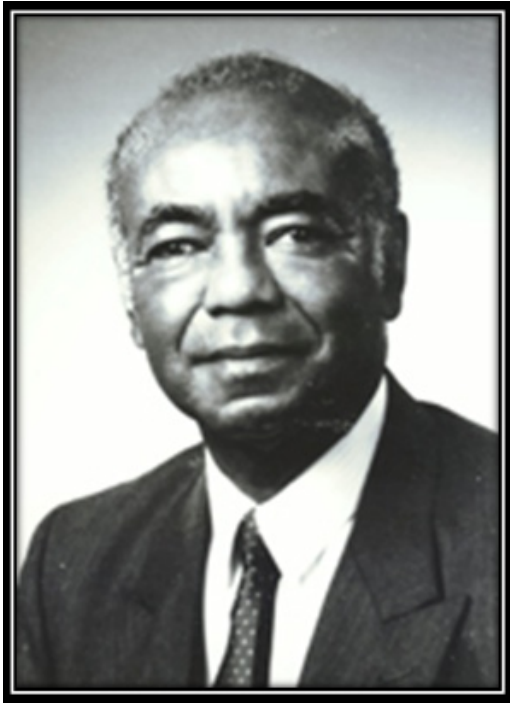

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. (January 15, 1929 – April 4, 1968) is best known for his role in advancing civil rights using nonviolent civil disobedience. Woodland Cemetery is proud to be the final resting place of many trailblazing Daytonians who devoted their careers to underserved communities and principles of social justice.

CJ McLin Jr.
5/31/1921 - 12/27/1988

C.J. McLin, Jr. represented Dayton in the Ohio State Legislature for 22 years. He was widely regarded as the chief spokesperson for the Black community at the local, regional, and state level.

He worked hard to advance legislation in several critical areas, including aid to low-income and elderly people, anti-crime and correctional institution issues, campaign reform, minority affairs, and higher education.

His social conscience and sustained commitment to the community propelled both private and public mainstream institutions to change attitudes and practices toward minorities.

Bootsie Neal
9/9/1952 - 1/24/2021

Idotha “Bootsie” Neal was a pioneer who made history as the first African American woman elected to the Dayton City Commission.

She advocated for underserved communities, social justice, and economic development, focusing on initiatives around education, healthcare, housing, jobs, poverty, and discrimination. Neal’s leadership and public service were widely respected, paving the way for future African American women in civic roles.

Her legacy inspires engagement in public service and more equitable communities.

James McGee

11/8/1918 - 3/4/2006

Much of McGee's early work was for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); he was involved in several landmark civil rights cases in the Dayton area. During his tenure as Mayor, James H. McGee greatly improved the well-being of the city and testified before Congress on behalf of Dayton. He traveled extensively throughout the U.S. and abroad, on behalf of both political and civil organizations.

Janet L. Roberts

Born 1/20/1925

By day, Janet Louise Roberts worked as a librarian at the reference desk of the Main branch of the Dayton and Montgomery County public library.

After hours, however, she spent her time writing exhaustively researched pulp romances—more than 100 novels in all.

To her publishers, she was known as “The Queen of Hearts” publishing under the pseudonyms Rebecca Danton, Louisa Bronte and Janette Radcliffe.

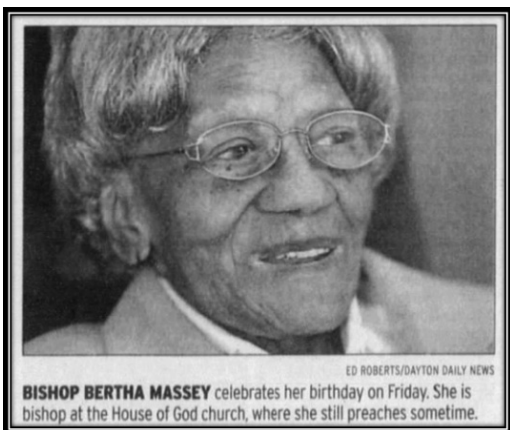


Janet Louise Roberts died in 1982, at the age of 57. She is buried in section 9, lot 2825 at Woodland Cemetery.

Bishop Bertha M. Massey (1/21/1897 - 5/5/2007)

Bertha Massey was born in Little Mountain, South Carolina on January 21st, 1897; the seventh of 15 children. Her earliest memories are of attending church.

Asked to share the secret of her longevity, Bishop Bertha Massey smiled and quipped, "It's not a secret. You just read your Bible and live by the rules of God. And never forget to treat other people the way you want to be treated."

Bertha M. Massey died May 5th, 2007 at the age of 110. She is buried in section 308, lot 350 at Woodland Cemetery.

Woodland is seeking volunteers to give presentations to community groups on subjects such as local history, notable biographies, and trees.

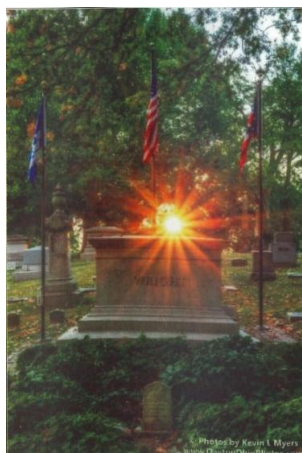
