Johann Weikel's Epitaph Translated:

In 2023, Woodland's preservation team repaired two broken gravestones belonging to John (or Johannes) and Catharine Weikel, located in section 77, lot 567.

While resetting the grave markers, we noticed a long and beautifully carved German epitaph on the backside of John's gravestone—but we weren't sure exactly what it said.

The preservation team reached out to Dr. Gary Schmidt; the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts & Professor of German at Wright State University.



This December, Dr. Schmidt visited Woodland to get a better look at the gravestone and take pictures of the epitaph.

In January, Dr. Schmidt completed his translation and we now know what John's gravestone says!



A big thank you to Dr. Schmidt for his assistance with the translation and helping us to preserve the history of Woodland Cemetery and the people of Dayton.

Original German:

Sterblicher du gehest vorbei, wo man mich hat hingeleget. Schaue hier dein Contrefey, wenn man dich zum Grabe träget. Meine Gruft ist dein Prophet, dass es dir wie mir ergeht. Dieser Staub ist auch vorhin Fleisch und Blut wie du gewesen. Wie ich jetzund Asche bin, so wird man von dir auch lesen. Man vergisst im Tode mein, so wird deiner vergessen seyn. Heute mir, und morgen dir, du mußt endlich an den Reyhen: darum stirb in Zeiten hier, so darfst du den Tod nicht scheuen, du hast keine Todesfrist Mensch, bedenk, was du doch bist.

English Translation:

Mortal you pass by, where I have been laid to rest. See here your likeness, when you are carried to the grave. My grave is your prophet, that that this will happen to you too. This dust was also once flesh and blood like you. As I am now ash, so too will one read of you. If one forgets me in death, you too will be forgotten. Today it is me, tomorrow you, in the end your turn must come: so die here for a time, that you may not shy away from death, your hour of death is not known, Oh living man, consider what you are.

Randolph J. Tams Born 2/9/1866

A childhood friend of Paul Laurence Dunbar, Randolph J. Tams was born in Harrisburg, Virginia in 1866. He moved to Dayton with his family at the age of 10, and soon after bonded with the young Paul Laurence Dunbar over their shared love for poetry and comedy. Dunbar would die on Tams' birthday, February 9th, in 1906.

Originally planning to become a postman, Randolph Tams changed his mind and took the examination for the Dayton Fire

Department instead. A firefighter for many years, Tams later joined the department's investigation bureau. Notably, he was never late to his post—not once in 32 years.

In 1908, Mr. Tams became the driver of the Dayton Fire Department's first ever automobile.

Rudolph J. Tams died in 1954, at the age of 88. He is buried in section 126, lot 26 at Woodland Cemetery.



Woodland Centenarian Club:

<u>Leroy "Roy" Forsyth</u> (2/26/1910 - 1/30/2011)

In May of 1933, Evelyn and Roy Forsyth drove their '29 Model A Ford on a day trip to Covington, Kentucky, to get married. They were together for 77 years. Together they had four children; John, Donald, Roy Jr. & Doris.


Roy worked for Frigidaire for 38 years, retiring in 1970. He was a devoted member of the Salem Church of God in Clayton, Ohio.

Leroy Forsyth died January 30th, 2011 at the age of 100. He is buried in section 307, lot Q at Woodland Cemetery.

Not into public speaking? Consider getting involved with our horticulture team, or assisting with special events & research projects.


