Women of Woodland

Woodland Cemetery is the final resting place of some of the most fascinating women in Dayton's history. Throughout March, the Minute will highlight the lives and careers of five women who made Dayton the city it is today.

The following article was written by Katharine Funkhouser for the "Next Door To You..." column & published in the *Dayton Daily News*, December 27th, 1936.

Rosalie Lowrey

2/27/1893 - 4/7/1951



"She is soft spoken and has gentle ways. Her walk is a little different from the ordinary walk, her bearing not quite a common one. Perhaps 'artistic temperament' explains these things, for we are speaking of Rosalie Lowrey of Harvard blvd. who is a real artist."

"Miss Lowrey's work is not unknown in Dayton. She is a Dayton product, and has exhibited paintings here at various times through a number of years.

She may even be called a charter member of the Art Institute, for she was one of the first to join the Montgomery County Art association, that early group which for a time had even no housing facilities.

Later it undertook the sponsorship of a class which grew into the old art school at the corner of Monument and St. Clair, and which ultimately became the Dayton Art Institute."

"Miss Lowrey's interest has ventured into many fields; portraits, pencil sketches, still life, landscapes and commercial art, but her chief work has been with portraits. Several years ago she won the distinct honor of being made an exhibiting member of the National Association of Women Painters and Sculptors, which affords her the privilege, under its sponsorship, of contributing to a yearly exhibition in New York City."

"Her educational background has been unusual. Following early years spent at private schools, she was graduated from Steele [high school]. She studied with Miss Collins, a Daytonian who had been a pupil of the Cincinnati artist, Frank Duvensk. Then came a period of work at the Art Students League in New York City in the illustration class of Thomas Fogarty.

She considers it one of her greatest honors to have been chosen as a member of a very small group taught by Cecilia Beaux, one of the most outstanding of modern portrait painters. She also was a student at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts."

"Immediately following her work with Miss Beaux, Miss Lowrey painted a portrait of her mother which has won the acclaim of worthy critics. It is probably one of the most outstanding portraits she has done.

With her unusual talent and her splendid training, Miss Lowrey already has achieved a distinct place in the realm of modern portrait painters. Could it be that her fond parents, in her earliest days, realized that her very name, softly and thoughtfully pronounced, could serve as an admirable pen portrait of her?"

<u>Behjat Bozorgi-nia</u> (3/1/1920 - 5/19/2023)

Behjat was born March 1st, 1920 in Iran. In 1937, she married Asadollah Bozorgi-nia. Together they raised two sons; Siavosh and Bijan, in Tehran.

Above all, Behjat valued family and education—values which she passed on to both her sons. Siavosh grew up to become a cardiac surgeon who practiced for many years here in Dayton. Bijan became an electrical engineer and successful businessman in California.



Behjat Bozorgi-nia passed away May 18th, 2023 at the age of 103; survived by her sons, 4 grandchildren, 9 great-grandchildren, and many others around the world who count themselves blessed to love and have been loved by her.



Woodland is seeking volunteers to give presentations to community groups on subjects such as local history, notable biographies, and trees.


