What's Blooming:

Abundant in southern Ohio, the Redbud heralds the arrival of spring with showy, lavender-pink flowers. Technically a member of the bean family, Redbud is also related to Honey locust, Kentucky Coffee tree, Black Locust, and Wisteria. A fast-growing tree, Redbuds typically reach 20 feet in height and live for about 20 years.

One of the Redbud's common names is the 'Judas Tree', due to the myth that Judas Iscariot hanged himself from a tree of this species. More likely, the common name was a misunderstanding of the French common name, 'Arbre De Judée', which means 'tree of Judea'—referring to the region where Redbuds were once common.

101 Years Ago at Woodland:

"Fairground Billy" Dies With Mystery of His Past Still Tight-Locked. One hundred and one years ago yesterday, a man known only as 'Fairground Billy' died in the shanty colony on the south Ludlow street dump. We can't put it any better than the Dayton Daily News reporter who wrote:

"'He loved a good horse,' will be 'Fairground Billy's' epitaph. Who he is, who are his kin, none of his neighbors know. It is believed Kentucky was his birthplace.

"Buried in his bosom, the secrets of a life that had left lines of experience upon his ever-smiling face, 'Fairground Billy' came to reside in the shanty village several years ago. Each winter found him helping to care for the horses at the fairground racetrack and his habit of lingerinng there gave him his unique name."

As far as we can tell, nobody ever found out who 'Fairground Billy' truly was. He was buried in Woodland's City Lot on April 26th, 1924.

Symbols of the Season

Shamrock or Clover:



The name shamrock comes from Irish seamróg, and simply means "young clover". There is no one "true" species of shamrock, but Trifolium dubium (lesser clover) is considered to be the shamrock by roughly half of Irish people.

Traditionally, shamrock is said to have been used by Saint Patrick to illustrate the Christian doctrine of the Holy Trinity when Christianising Ireland in the 5th century. As St. Patrick is Ireland's patron saint, the shamrock has been used as a symbol of Ireland since the 18th century.
