#### Jeraldyne Blunden and Julia Shaw Patterson Carnell Dancer/Choreographer and Patron of the Arts



Jeraldyne Blunden was the founder and artistic director of the esteemed Dayton Contemporary Dance Company, the world's largest repository of reconstructed dance works by African-American choreographers. Jeraldyne began her dance training at the age of eight under the guidance of Josephine and Hermene Schwarz, founders of The Dayton Ballet.

At the age of 19, when she took over the dance school at the Linden Center, started by the Schwarz sisters, Jeraldyne continued the tradition of providing opportunities for her dancers, sending them to study during summers at such notable training centers as the Dance Theatre of Harlem, American Dance Festival and the Alvin Ailey American Dance Center.

Throughout her life Jeraldyne received numerous awards and commendations including the prestigious John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation "Genius" Fellowship Award in 1994. Mrs. Blunden was also awarded honorary Doctorate Degrees from the University of Dayton and Wright State University.

Jeraldyne Blunden was born on December 10, 1940 and died on November 2, 1999 at the age of 58. She is located in Section 146 in the Woodland Mausoleum.

Julia Shaw Patterson Carnell was the wife of affluent businessman, Harrie G. Carnell. Her first marriage was to Frank J. Patterson (died 1901), brother of John H. Patterson. Julia had already developed the old art museum on St. Clair Street in Dayton and became the leading spirit behind the establishment of the Dayton Art Museum. Mrs. Carnell promised to construct a new art museum for the city of Dayton if the community would pay for its operations. The challenge was met and Mrs. Carnell donated nearly \$2 million on the eve of the Great Depression.




In addition to the Dayton Art Museum, Julia, along with her brother-in-law John H. Patterson and nephew Robert Dun Patterson, raised the seed money to establish The Dayton Foundation and created its first unrestricted endowment fund. Julia was a businesswoman, community leader and philanthropist. She earned the distinction of being the first woman in Dayton to sit on a bank board of directors.

Julia Shaw Patterson Carnell was born on July 10, 1863 and died on February 12, 1944 at the age of 80. She is buried in Section 13 Lot 365 in the Patterson Family Lot.


