

Some Monuments of Woodland

International Day for Monuments and Sites is an international observance held on April 18 each year around the world with different types of activities, including visits to monuments and heritage sites. From 1893 to 1896, many large monuments were placed at Woodland. Some came in easy while others created challenges for the movers.

The Dayton Herald December 13, 1893

Staniland, Merkle & Staniland were prohibited yesterday by the B.C.A. from hauling a thirteen-ton stone over the Washington street bridge. The stone was destined for Woodland Cemetery, where the above firm are erecting a monument for R.C. Schenck, and this stone was to be the base. It was on a stoutly built wagon, weighing one ton, and ten horses were required to draw the wagon. After being refused permission to cross the bridge referred to, the workmen attempted to cross the Fifth street bridge, and were again met with a peremptory refusal. The stone was hauled back to the vards, and will be loaded on a flat car, and taken over the railroad bridge.

John Alexander Collins decreed in his will that a sum of \$10,000 be set aside and used for the erection of a monument to the memory of railroad engineers. Mr. Collins was builder of the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton (C.H.&D.) Railroad. The obelisk was cut from a solid piece of granite quarried in Vermont.

From ground to top, the monument stands 56 feet tall and just the base itself weighs over 25,000 pounds.

The Dayton Herald, July 16, 1896: "The large granite shaft for the monument of John A. Collins in Woodland Cemetery arrived in the city the early part of the week. It was not without some trouble that it was removed to the cemetery."



Item six of the Charles
Roesch
will reads: "I will and direct my
executor to select a suitable
lot on which I am to be buried
in Woodland cemetery at
Dayton, O., and to erect
thereon a monument to
perpetuate my memory, the
expense of said lot and
monument not to exceed
three thousand dollars
(3,000)."

The Dayton Herald, July 2, 1896: "Upon the front of the monument is a likeness of Mr. Roesch, done in bronze relief. The likeness is an excellent one, and this distinguishes the monument from all the rest in the cemetery."
