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The next day the breakout sessions were presented. They included talks on marketing and branding, ways to increase revenue, growing endowment, maintenance practices, monument restoration, sales policies and procedures, cremation ideas for small areas, customer relations, religious burial practices, and crisis communications.

Thank you to all who participated in this successful event.

I addressed the participants during the convention banquet. The following is a summary of what I said:

What is the Ohio Cemetery Association? How does it help us as cemeterians? Where is it going? What will happen if it doesn't exist? What will it look like in the coming years? These are questions I have asked myself over the past year and the Board has been addressing. Quite frankly we are in a transition. It's not the same as when I first became a member in 1998 and even more so prior to that, when there was double the membership and 150+ attending the various events. Times have changed. Many cemeteries have tightened up their budgets and staff; many townships struggle to find the money to maintain their properties let alone their communities, add to their challenge if they have to take on management of an abandoned cemetery; many cemeteries are now part of a corporation; and frankly it's easier to find information when the internet is at your fingers.

I believe the OCA is worth fighting for! In the code of regulations, our purpose is: to provide support to Ohio cemeteries through training, education and legislative assistance and to instill a spirit of cooperation and fellowship among its members and peer groups throughout the state of Ohio. We have an obligation to the families that use our cemeteries to stay educated in management practices and in the products we use and sell. I believe we are obligated to be a source of knowledge for those who are out of touch. You would be amazed with some of the cases that the Ohio Cemetery Dispute Resolution Commission has to deal with, which several Board members are involved in. And the many phone calls and emails from cemeterians and consumers we get, looking for help just because we are an authority. And with the rocky political climate and consumer advocates all around we need to keep our eyes and ears open to any legislative issues that may affect our industry.

So what do we do about all of these changes? That's what the Board has been exploring these last couple of years. We have shortened up and slightly changed the formats of our educational events. We have contracted with Watt & Co., a marketing and communication consultant, to expand our identity on our website, newsletter and other social media. Ultimately that may be where we end up, with more communications through emails and the website. But that takes a lot of time and money to create. And how does that happen?

We will keep exploring and making changes to see works and what doesn't. But we need your help and input. It doesn't make sense that only 10 of us make decisions that will affect all of us.

In conclusion, this association is worth fighting for. Help us, in helping you!



Harry Bullis, former chairman of the board of General Mills, used to give his salespeople the following advice.

Cemetery Spotlight

Perry Township Cemeteries Lake County, Ohio

Perry Cemeteries are owned and operated by the Perry Township Trustees and located in Lake County. Two active cemeteries serve Perry - South Ridge with 220 burials and Center Road Cemetery with 6450 burials to date. Our veteran burials number 965. The vault, pictured on the right, was constructed in

1880 to store bodies during winter until burials could be accomplished in the spring. It is now utilized as our Veterans' Memorial surrounded by

flags representing the five branches of the military, commemorative bricks and flag holders honoring Revolutionary War veterans from Perry. Ezra Beebe was the earliest Revolutionary War veteran to be buried in Center Road Cemetery in 1813.

Earliest recorded burials in Center Road Cemetery were in 1811 when graves could be purchased for \$1.50 each. Currently, residents purchase graves at a cost of \$300 each. Perry has 95- 100 burials each year, approximately 1/3 of which are cremations. All services are provided at resident and non-resident rates.

With an eye to future burial needs, the Trustees expanded Perry's cemetery land by purchasing 25 acres adjacent to Center Road Cemetery to be used for future cemetery development as the need arises. At the present time, there are 1607 available graves in Center Road Cemetery and 168 available in South Ridge Cemetery. Perry Cemeteries allow upright, slant and flush monuments.

All services, other than monument fabrication, are performed by a six-man Service Department staff who keep our cemeteries beautifully maintained. We are honored that many families choose our cemeteries as their final resting place.

Cemetery Spotlight

Greenwood Cemetery Hamilton, Ohio

A Piece of History in Hamilton, Ohio

Hamilton's earliest burials were in public grounds, in the area of what is now the intersection of Front and High Streets. Other sites included: the Third Ward Cemetery between Third, Fourth, and Sycamore Streets (also known as Ludlow Park or Third Ward Park); the Rossville Cemetery (First Ward) at Park and D Streets (now Sutherland Park) on the west side. On occasion, family yards, rural plots, and farms became places of interment.

In the 1840's, Hamilton's leaders felt the need for a community cemetery. In 1848, **Greenwood Cemetery Association was** established. The cemetery land was purchased from David Bigham. The cemetery contains more than 1.800 remains from Hamilton's two pioneer cemeteries. Greenwood was modeled after the worldfamous Mt. Auburn Cemetery in Boston and the Spring Grove Cemetery in Cincinnati. Adolph Strauch, the landscape architect and gardener who designed Spring Grove also planned Greenwood, although most of the work laying out the cemetery was done by prominent Hamilton citizens John W. Erwin, John M. Millikin, and Governor William Bebb. It is in the style of a park containing beautiful mortuary art. Many people who made major contributions to Hamilton, Butler County, the State of Ohio, and the nation are buried at Greenwood. Hamilton historian Jim Blount has written profiles of some of these people in his book Greenwood Biographies.

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Deceased veterans of all wars from the American Revolution to the present are buried at Greenwood, including the only Civil War general from Butler County and some of the most recent fallen heroes from the war in Iraq.

In 1994, Greenwood Cemetery was listed on the National Register of Historic Places by the United States Department of the Interior.

Greenwood Cemetery exists in the city of Hamilton which has been known as the city of sculpture, but Greenwood Cemetery is Hamilton's original sculpture park!


Opened in 1848, Greenwood has thousands of monuments which are works of art in themselves! Walking through the cemetery, one can see the transitions Hamilton has endured, beginning with the days of Fort Hamilton and moving onto when the city was known for all of its manufacturing, through the large variety of personal mausoleums and memorials. The cemetery's upmost purpose is to commemorate the lives of our loved ones. Greenwood Cemetery has availability for the next 100 years so please come and visit us!

Principles For Achieving Commitment And Results


"Leaders are only as powerful as the ideas they can communicate." Warren Bennis

A leader is a person who has the vision of where the company is going and a plan for getting there. Often the leader is not effective in getting his or her people equally dedicated to making the vision a reality. When this occurs there is an enormous gap between the people's commitment and the leader's desired results.

To close the gap, the leader must execute five key principles on a consistent basis to make certain that the goals of the organization are achieved. Effective leadership is founded on one basic premise, the ability to influence the attitudes, behaviors, and actions of others. To accomplish this objective the leader must understand what is required to gain people's commitment and get them to want what the leader wants.

Translate the vision into reality – The reality is defined by telling your staff the company's main purpose: where you are going, how you will get there, what you need to do today, and how you should do it.

Give people a sense of meaning – It is important for people to have a sense of significance in what they do. To get people's commitment the leader must relate how their specific task impacts the overall organization's success.



Keep them informed – To keep people involved and motivated about achieving the company's goals, they must be kept in the loop. If you want them to be a part of the process, they need to know how things are progressing. Let them know what is going well and what is not.

Let people know they matter – Not patronizing, but encouraging. People have a need to know that they are making a positive contribution and that their efforts are noticed. As simple as it sounds, a small thank you, I appreciate that you..., I noticed that you... goes a long way.

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Follow-through – Following through helps the leader to ensure the people are doing the things they need to be doing and within the right timeframes. It will also help the leader discover if there is a gap between commitment and the desired results.

Getting results does not just require the correct approach; it also requires discipline and an effective system.


