## Notes from Tim Long

Total Return Committee: An Ad Hoc Committee comprised of the OCA Legislative Committee and other OCA Members, counsel and several financial industry experts met during the March Convention to discuss the possibility of seeking to a major revision to Ohio Revised Code Section 1721.21. Specifically, while the current statute allows for the withdrawal of only "dividends and interest" from statutorily required Endowment Care Trust, shifting to a "total return" standard would allow the annual withdrawal of a stated percentage of the Trust's principal balance. The theory behind such a shift is that removing the Trust's inherent bias toward investments that produce dividends and interest will allow the fund to grow more over time, basically by inclusion of more growth stocks, and better serve the cemetery's need for perpetual maintenance. The Ad Hoc Committee reviewed several articles which summarized research which support such theory and found the argument for allowing a total return standard as an alternative to be compelling.

As such, while HB 168, which would create the "Cemetery Grant Program" was working its way through the House of Representatives, the OCA requested the Bill's Sponsor, Representative Stein, consider allowing a "total return amendment" to HB 168. However, the Sponsor ultimately decided against such inclusion as it would likely slow the Bill's path toward passage.

Now that HB 168 has been passed by the House and is before the Senate Finance Committee, the OCA again explored the possibility of adding a "total return amendment" to the Bill at this juncture. However, the Sponsor remains concerned that adding such a topic to HB 168 would make its passage, before the Legislature largely departs to campaign for the 2018 elections, less certain. Therefore, the OCA withdrew the request to amend HB 168 and continues to

search another vehicle to attempt to add the

total return alternative to ORC 1721.21.



# Cemetery Spotlight: City of Marysville - Oakdale Cemetery

Oakdale cemetery is located in Marysville, Ohio and was established in 1880. The first burial place in Marysville was situated on North Walnut Street, which was founded around the time the Village of Marysville was platted in 1819. In 1893, the New York Central Railroad procured right of way through the village so the cemetery had to be moved.

June 5th, 1877 citizens of Marysville voted to raise a tax sufficient to purchase grounds for a new cemetery. On April 11th, 1879, 39.5 acres of woodlands was purchased for \$1,975. This land was platted into lots and driveways and became Oakdale Cemetery. The interments from the North Walnut Street cemetery were disinterred and moved to Oakdale Cemetery.

Section C was the first section in Oakdale and it includes the tallest monument. The first burial in Oakdale was a one year old boy named Earl Lyn Wilcox in May of 1880. The trustees enclosed this grave with an iron fence which still stands today.

Oakdale is home to Noah Orr, who was known as "Marysville's Giant". Noah was born on September 19th, 1836

in Union County, and grew to stand at almost 8 feet tall and weighed around 550 pounds. He served on the 4th Ohio Volunteer Infantry as part of the Civil War. After leaving the army he dedicated his life to theater and traveled the world after the 1850s as a giant and performer as part of the P.T. Barnum's Circus in New York, and other leading circuses. Throughout his travels he performed for many European leaders, including Queen Victoria of England. Noah's famous career ended when he passed away on July 1st, 1882 in his Marysville home after a long illness. He is now buried in Oakdale Cemetery.

Oakdale has a few other "famous" people including James E. Robinson who is the grandfather of former first lady Barbara Bush, Colonel Dana W. Morey, and General Robert S. Beightler.

#### Cemetery Spotlight continued.

Oakdale has grown over the years. It now consists of 50 acres, 13 sections, and 2 mausoleums. With most of lots being spoken for in the older sections we had to open 2 new sections, P & Q, in 2015. Currently Oakdale has 12,365 interments and we sell on average 50 graves a year. At this rate our 2 new sections will be filled within the next 20 years. Once this happens we will have to explore options on how to move forward with Oakdale and what direction we would like to see the cemetery go in. We have come up with several ideas on how to make Oakdale better and see continual improvement through the years.
